*In Memoriam* BILL STEWART

**Tuesday, November 12, was a difficult day for the DOS family and a worldwide community of birders beyond our state lines** – we lost a local birding champion and conservation advocate whose boundless passion shaped the course of those who were fortunate to cross his path. Surrounded by dear friends and family, Bill Stewart passed away as the first snow of the season fell on a bitterly cold afternoon. If you were a regular participant on his many DOS field trips or a volunteer assisting with any of the multiple initiatives he spear-headed, you are no doubt familiar with his expertise and his joyful (some might say mischievous) laugh. You may not be familiar with the breadth and depth of his awe-inspiring roster of accomplishments. Please read on to learn about and be inspired by Bill's many achievements.

If you would like to help DOS carry on his impressive legacy, consider a year-end donation to the Bill Stewart Memorial Fund. Bill's energy and imagination were boundless -- it's no surprise that, within days of his death, his friends and colleagues began discussing multiple projects that would expand initiatives he championed. **In Memoriam: Bill Stewart (1952-2019)  
DOS Conservation Legend**

Bill Stewart had a long association with DOS as an occasional participant in field trips and programs, but in the mid-2000's he jumped into birds and bird conservation "with both feet". One of Bill's first major DOS projects was as a key member of the steering committee for the development of the Delaware Birding Trail, which helped put the state "on the map" for birds!

It wasn't long until he was appointed Conservation Chair of DOS (2006). In this role, he was responsible for developing and implementing many of the signature programs of the Society, notably the annual Delaware Bird-A-Thon. Begun in 2007, the Delaware Bird-A-Thon has raised over half a million dollars for Delaware bayshore habitat preservation and protected nearly 2,000 acres and counting for migratory shorebirds and other coastal species of concern. The concept of a bird-a-thon was not new, but Bill's vision for it in Delaware was

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innovative in several ways. The Delaware Bird-A-Thon was the first to focus the competition on fundraising, rather than just number of birds seen, and one of the first to adopt a mission that could reach contributors from outside of the state and region.

Bill initiated the DOS funding relationship with DuPont Clear Into the Future (CITF), a lead sponsor of Bird-A-Thon during its early years. In addition, he spearheaded a partnership with DuPont CITF (and later, Delmarva Power and other sponsors) to install and maintain the Wilmington Peregrine Falcon Webcam, which provides a very popular and educational live feed of the Wilmington peregrine falcon nest box, and has greatly raised the profile of DOS in the City of Wilmington and beyond. Bill also conceived, funded, and implemented another signature urban program, the Lights Out! Wilmington campaign in 2011, applying for and receiving a State Greenhouse Gas Reduction Grant to get this project, aimed at reducing mortality to night migrating songbirds, off the ground.

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Bill has also been an active promoter of the Duck Stamp. He served on the Board for the Friends of the Migratory Bird/Duck Stamp and spurred DOS to contribute significant funding in 2009 to a successful nationwide marketing campaign designed to encourage birders to purchase duck stamps, thereby extending the reach of this powerful wetland conservation program. For his efforts, Bill was awarded the 2010 Conservation Champion Award from the USFWS and the 2010 Citizen's Award from the US Dept. of Interior.

Bill had a passion for education, as well as conservation. He was active as a leader for the Delaware Dunlins Youth Birders Club of DOS, and he regularly inspired youth and adult birders alike on field trips he led for DOS and for the ABA.



In 2013, Bill stepped down as Chair the DOS Conservation Committee to assume the role of Vice President (2013-2015), and then President (2015-2017) of the Society. Bill Stewart's leadership has been essential to redefining the conservation role of DOS over the past decade, and through his marketing savvy, his infectious enthusiasm, and his tenacious dedication, he helped position the Society to make an even greater difference for birds in the future. In recognition of his many accomplishments, Bill was elected a Fellow of DOS in 2009, and received the DOS Conservation Award in 2014.

From 2012 to 2018, Bill worked for the American Birding Association, serving first as the Director of Partnerships and Marketing, then as Director of Conservation and Community, where he pursued innovative and collaborative approaches to bird education and bird

conservation. While at the ABA, Bill led the Young Birder of the Year program as well as the Spark Bird Project. He was the founder and Director of the ABA's Camp Avocet based in Lewes, which brought together two dozen teen birders from around the US and abroad. Under Bill's direction, Camp Avocet was a six day experience of birding and conservation education along the Delmarva Peninsula, featuring his beloved Delaware as the crown jewel and home base.

In 2011, Bill founded Red Knot Outfitters Birding Guides, a Delaware-based custom tour company that specializes in education-based birding tours. Through this company, Bill was able to share the significance of Delaware as critical habitat for migratory and nesting birds along the eastern seaboard in a more intimate and focused "Bill Stewart" way. Red Knot Outfitters has worked with hundreds of school students and adults each year, in all three Delaware counties.

Bill was extremely proud of his last professional endeavor as a co-founder and Chairman of the highly successful *Frontiers in Ornithology: A Symposium for Youth*, held in late September 2019. The mission of the symposium was to provide middle school through college students with exposure to cutting-edge technologies being used in avian research and study, careers in ornithology and conservation, and advice on how to pursue that focus and take their passion for birds to a higher level. Registration for the event was sold out in 2019, and drew students and presenters from across the United States. At the time of his death, Bill was helping plan the 2020 *Frontiers in Ornithology Symposium*.



With his easy, humble nature and infectious enthusiasm, Bill Stewart had a special gift for making people feel welcome in the birding community. At the same time, his focus on conservation and personal responsibility for the well-being of the birds we all enjoy meant that he could also encourage new birders to immediately feel that they had a central role in conservation. He ran meetings, field trips, and programs with a strong sense of purpose, and he recruited all of us to his causes easily, leading by example with his Herculean work ethic. Bill was at the very heart of Delaware's birding community. We hope that every member of DOS joins us in honoring his memory by taking a little more time to spread the word about birds and birding, and to engage more fully in actions to protect birds and their habitats.

**Field Trip Info:** All members and guests are welcome! Just a few trips that are noted are restricted to DOS members due to space limitations. Field trip descriptions alert you to locations that are known to require entrance fees, but be aware a leader on any trip may choose to go to a location that requires fees/tolls. The Conservation Access Pass must be purchased in advance. Participation in field trips is at your own risk. We love pets, but we cannot allow them to come on our field trips. Please help our leaders and environment by carpooling, especially on trips which include several locations - it's a great way to get to know other bird lovers! Half day trips will usually end before lunchtime unless otherwise noted. Please feel free to contact trip leaders if you have any questions. Thanks for joining us! **When the raptors are slow at Cape Henlopen, birders have the advantage of watching the ocean** for seabirds that put on a show as they follow the coastline south. In fact, if raptors aren't really your interest, the hawk watch platform is the perfect place to scan the ocean for other things.

From mid-October through November, there are typically great flights of Surf Scoter and Black Scoter, when up to 5,000 of these sea ducks can be observed in one day. White-winged Scoters are also observed in small numbers each year, generally in November. Common Eiders (just a few) are seen in late November during most years, and this year eiders were seen on November 4. Gannets are present daily from late October through November and it is fascinating to see the different ages of the gannets all in one location, from the dark immature birds to the mottled sub-adults to the beautiful white adults with the black wingtips. Brown Pelicans are seen almost daily early in the season.

Large flocks of Snow Geese arrive in late November where up to 6,000 will gather and "raft up" on the ocean to float by the platform. Occasionally they take flight and fill the sky with their raucous calls. In 2018 there were huge Snow Geese



flocks with several days of over 35,000 geese. The CHHW spotters managed to find a Greater White-fronted Goose in a Snow Goose flock last year. The flocks were so close they also saw a few geese with readable yellow numbered neck bands that they reported to the USGS bird banding lab.

Common and Red-throated Loons will migrate past in high numbers - Jen Ottinger was surprised at how many Red-throated Loons were observed from Henlopen in her first year. They often out-number the Common Loon in late November when hundreds can be seen in one day. At the end of November in 2017, they counted almost 700 Red-throated Loons in a single day!

Jen and her crew also saw a good variety of ducks from the platform during November including Redhead, Canvasback, Ring-necked Duck, Common Goldeneye, Greater Scaup, Lesser Scaup, Long-tailed Duck and Red-breasted Merganser.

Of course gulls are a daily occurrence and Henlopen is the place to go for the Lesser Black-backed Gull. With the presence of gulls come Jaegers. Parasitic Jaegers are seen in October and early November and there have been a few isolated sightings of Pomarine Jaeger in recent years. A Long-tailed Jaeger flew past in November 2014.

A few rare non-raptors have been documented over the years including a Wood Stork in 2017 and a Red-necked Grebe in 2013. American White Pelicans are seen most years during November, and on November 5 this year (2019), a Great



Shearwater was seen loafing on the water and preening for over an hour.

Sea Mammals add interest at the platform. Dolphins are present daily and sometimes come in close to shore. Whales are also seen yearly from the hawk watch, generally in late November, and occasionally we also observe a seal head pop up out of the water. A rarely seen fish, the giant



Sunfish has also been seen gently moving its top fin up and down in the ocean waves.

The highest number of sea birds is observed on a strong east



wind, but the strong east winds of November are also the coldest time to be watching from the hawk watch platform. Cape Henlopen Hawk Watch counts plenty of raptors, but if you want a total experience of fall migration along the coast, turn your optics towards the ocean every so often and look low over the waves for mammals, fish, and other birds!
